Cook’s Corner

Lemon Dill Cucumbers

You’ll need:

- 1/4 cup white vinegar
- 2 tablespoons white sugar
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

What to do:

1. Combine vinegar, sugar, lemon juice and spices in a medium bowl.
2. Add cucumbers and toss with liquid mixture.
3. Chill for 2 hours and serve. Serves 4.
